SING WITH THE MUSIC

They will work with the entire production staff to develop the props list, budget, and appropriate design of the props. They will work with the props crew in building, setting up, and running the props during construction, performance, and strike. The workshop will also look at sources for props. You had a great audition. You got the role. Now what? With **AMY ROSS**, you will explore all the different tools in an actor's toolbox that will help you "find" the character.


PRESENCE AND FULL-BODY ACTION

Professional actor **DAN BUTLER**, of television, Broadway, Off-Broadway, and screen, got his start in Fort Wayne attending Snider and Northrop High Schools, doing shows at the Festival Theatre in Franke Park as well as the Civic Theatre and P.I.T. (Purdue Indiana Theatre) while attending IPFW. Some may know him best for playing the role of Bulldog on the TV sitcom, *Frasier*, for 7 seasons. Dan's acting career spans many platforms of acting in the industry, and he is also a writer, poet, director, and producer.

Dan's humorous and constructive stories will serve as a guide to uncovering your own particular path to a career in the theatre and what it means to be a "working actor" for a living. Dan's many acting credits include -Broadway: *Travesties* and *Twentieth Century* (both at Roundabout); *Biloxi Blues* (Neil Simon); *The Hothouse* (Broadway); Off-Broadway/Regional; *When Harry Met Rehab* (Greenhouse Theatre in Chicago), *Lessons in Survival* (The Commissary/Vineyard); *The Weir* (Irish Rep, both on stage and virtual in 2020); *WarholCapote* (A.R.T.); *The Insurgents* (Labyrinth); *Laughing Wild* and *Slow Food* (both at Dorset), *Toast* (Public); *Irish Curse* (Soho Playhouse); *Old Money* (Lincoln Ctr.); *The Only Thing Worse You Could've Told Me...* (Actor's Playhouse, Drama Desk/ Outer Critics nominations); *Beast* and *Emerald City* (both at NYTW); *Lisbon Traviata* (MTC/Mark Taper); *Widow Claire* (Circle in the Square downtown); *True West* (Cherry Lane). PHILLIP H. COLGLAZIER has worked for the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre for more than 28 years. He has Directed and Choreographed over 68 productions for the Civic Theatre since 1993. He was honored at the Indiana Arts Leadership Awards as the 2008 Arts Administrator by the Indiana Coalition for the Arts. Phillip has served as the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre's Executive/Artistic Director since 2000, after serving one year as the Managing Director of Edyvean Repertory Theatre (E.R.T.) in Indianapolis. Prior to ERT, he worked at the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre as Interim Executive Director, Development/Education Director, Guest Director, and Choreographer. Phillip performed professionally as an Actors Equity Member for 12 years in musical theatre and television. He appeared in a Broadway Revue in Seoul, Korea under the direction of Baayork Lee (the original Connie Wong in A Chorus Line). While in Europe, he performed under the direction of Gillian Lynne in the Vienna, Austria's company of Cats and with RAI UNO's television program Fantastico 5 in Rome, Italy. Phillip earned his membership into the Actor's Equity Association by performing the roles of Paul in A Chorus Line and Chino in West Side Story at Beef-N-Boards Dinner Theatre in Indianapolis. As a playwright, Phillip has written Best Intentions, The Marquee Quest, and ... before I wake ... He obtained a Bachelor of Science in Speech Communication and Theatre from Ball State University.
